Sound Art and Music

- Sound art is a time-based art, but while composers create movement in time that becomes music, sonic artists create sound objects that move in time (Linda Dusman, New Music Box, 2008)
- I see the sound artist's works as more focused on sound issues.
 What are the possibilities and ways to manipulate it in order to restructure, and maybe re-use, the sound as another outfit?
 (Marcello Armani, Noisy, 2011)
- Music stands alone and creates an emotional experience. Sound art needs to be accompanied by an explanation of its purpose and a justification for its existence in wanky-bollocks Art-Speak. (Koz Wok, Quora, 2017)

Who Is Laurie Anderson?

Multiple Sources – The Art Story Very Helpful

- Born in suburban Chicago in 1947
- One of 8 kids
- All the kids were made to play a musical instrument - with varying degrees of success
- Laurie learned violin from 5 years old and performed with the Chicago Youth Symphony Orchestra
- At 16 she started exploring other forms including painting and sculpture



Importance of the Spoken Word

- Quote: "I would love to climb to the top of a tree and read a book, with so many worlds opening up that way."
- Large collection of spoken word records at home
- Story telling was a big part of her childhood

Education


- Started off studying biology but had too much fun using chlorophyll pigments to make watercolors
- Art History degree from Barnard College New York 1969
- "I was very excited by minimal art and minimal art theory. Actually, I loved the way people talked about it more than the work itself."
- MFA in sculpture from Columbia University 1972
- Art teacher, illustrator, writer

Early Performance Art

- Automotive car horns on a public common
- Duets on Ice playing cowboy songs on a self playing violin wearing ice skates frozen in blocks of ice
- As:If a series of personal stories with blown-up projections of words and a drone-like soundtrack

Breakout Album




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O-Superman

- NO IM NOT GOING TO PLAY O-SUPERMAN!
- 1981 this Iconic 8 minute track was picked up by UK DJ John Peel and played on BBC radio several times
- Couldn't believe it when I first heard it like nothing on the radio
- Went to #2 in UK music charts
- Laurie hadn't prepared for success
- Signed a deal with Warner Brothers and released Big Science
- O-Superman is on just about every modern art syllabus as an example of sound art

- Big Science seminal album and influenced work of many musicians
